IACCCA invites you to take part in an in-depth debate on how the ecological challenges of our era influence artistic practices.

The Symposium will feature high-profile professionals from the world of culture: artists, curators, scholars, creative producers and representatives of cultural organisations who will discuss the role of art in imagining new ways of living in our present time.

Through this Symposium, IACCCA wishes to acquaint participants with the new artistic practices being developed in the face of crucial issues such as human disruption of the ecosystem. The idea is to offer participants an opportunity to broaden their ways of thinking and to discuss how we can all act and integrate art into our environments.

The discussions will take place in two sessions, each featuring speakers who are invited to present a 20-minute paper. Presentations will be followed by a moderated debate among panel members and a longer discussion on critical issues that will be open to audience participation.

HEIDI BALLET MARKUS REYMANN LUCY WOOD

HEIDI BALLET

Heidi Ballet is an independent Belgian curator based in Berlin. Active in the field of new ecology, she recently curated Beaufort 21, the Triennial of Contemporary Art by the Sea, on the Belgian coast and, together with Milena Hoegsberg, LIAF 2017, the Biennial of the Lofoten International Art Festival (LIAF), in Norway. In 2016 she was in charge of the Satellite exhibition series titled *Our Ocean, Your Horizon* at Jeu de Paume in Paris and CAPC Bordeaux, as well as the group exhibition *The Morality Reflex* at the Contemporary Art Centre (CAC) in Vilnius.

Between 2012 and 2015, Ballet worked as a researcher and assistant curator for the Taipei Biennial (2012) and for Haus der Kulturen der Welt in Berlin (2013–15). Before relocating to Berlin, she was gallery director at Jan Mot in Brussels from 2008 until 2012. Her writings have appeared in *Mousse Magazine*, *RanDian* and *Art Papers*.



MARKUS REYMANN

Markus Reymann is Director of TBA21-Academy, a cultural organisation fostering dialogue and exchange surrounding the most urgent ecological, social and economic issues facing our oceans today. Reymann leads the non-profit entity's engagement with artists, activists, scientists and policy-makers worldwide, resulting in the creation of new commissions, new bodies of knowledge and new policies advancing the conservation and protection of the oceans.

In March 2019, TBA21-Academy launched Ocean Space, a new global port for critical ocean literacy, research and advocacy located in Venice. Reymann also serves as Chair of Alligator Head Foundation, which established and maintains the East Portland Fish Sanctuary and oversees a marine wet laboratory in Jamaica.



LUCY WOOD

Lucy Wood is an experienced creative producer specialising in art-science and climate change engagement programmes, from artist-scientist commissions through to communications and audience development. Over the past 12 years she has run high-impact events and installations across the UK focusing on climate change and intersectional environmental issues, collaborating with world-leading artists, scientists and institutions for organisations such as Somerset House, MSI Manchester, Greenwich Maritime Museum and global climate festival ArtCop21.

In June 2018 she was the lead producer of *Under Her Eye: Women and Climate Change* at the British Library, headlined by Margaret Atwood, for the acclaimed arts-science organisation Invisible Dust. Wood was previously UK Director of International Environmental Arts Charity, Cape Farewell. She has written for various publications, including *The Guardian*, *South Atlantic Quarterly* and *Run Riot*.

DANIEL STEEGMANN MANGRANÉ

Daniel Steegmann Mangrané is a Catalan artist based in Rio de Janeiro whose research centres on biological processes and anthropological discourses. These inspire works that blur the traditional boundaries between culture and nature, subjects and objects, reality and dreams, visible and invisible, corporeal and incorporeal ... dissolving them into relationships of mutual transformation.

In recent years he has shown his oeuvre in museums and biennials around the world, including the Taipei, Berlin and São Paulo Biennials, Pirelli HangarBicocca, Serralves Museum, Institut d'art contemporain of Villeurbanne, Nottingham Contemporary and CCS Bard. His work forms part of the permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art in Rio de Janeiro, Inhotim, São Paulo Museum of Modern Art, Tate Modern, Serralves Museum, Walker Art Center, MACBA, Collection Pinault and Castello de Rivoli, among others.



COOKING SECTIONS

Established in London in 2013, Cooking Sections is a duo of spatial practitioners [Daniel Fernández Pascual & Alon Schwabe] who explore the systems that organise the world through food. Using installation and performance, their research-based practice examines the overlapping boundaries between visual arts, architecture, ecology and geopolitics. They have worked on multiple iterations of the long-term site-responsive CLIMAVORE project since 2015, looking into how to eat as humans change climates. In 2016 they opened The Empire Remains Shop, a platform to critically speculate on the implications of selling the remains of Empire today. They lead a studio unit at the Royal College of Art, London, and are guest professors at the Academy of Fine Arts, Munich.

Their work has been exhibited at Tate Britain, the 58th Venice Biennale, the U.S. Pavilion at the 2014 Venice Architecture Biennale, Los Angeles Public Art Triennial 2019, Sharjah Biennial 13, Performa 17, Manifesta 12, Serpentine Galleries, Atlas Arts in Skye, and is part of British Art Show 9. Cooking Sections has been nominated for the 2021 Turner Prize.



T.J. DEMOS

T. J. Demos is an award-winning writer on the intersection of contemporary art, global politics, and ecology. His published work, which examines the ability of artistic practice to invent innovative strategies that challenge dominant social, political, and economic conventions, has appeared in magazines, journals, catalogues, and books worldwide, including Against the Anthropocene: Visual Culture and Environment Today (2017). Professor in the Department of the History of Art and Visual Culture at University of California, Santa Cruz, he is also the Founder and Director of its Center for Creative Ecologies, where from 2018-20 he worked in Beyond the End of the World, a Mellon-funded research project, series of art exhibitions. and book dedicated to the questions: What comes after the end of the world? And how can we cultivate futures of social justice within capitalist ruins? Additionally, Demos served on the editorial board of Art Journal (2004-08) and currently sits on the editorial board of Third Text and on the advisory board of Grey Room.

Demos has been the recipient of numerous distinguished fellowships and awards, including the Mellon Sawyer Seminar fellowship (2019–21), the Getty Research Institute fellowship (2020), and the College Art Association's Frank Jewett Mather Award for Art Criticism (2014).



ALICE SHARP


Alice Sharp is a prominent UK advisor and speaker on arts and sustainability. At Invisible Dust, the award-winning art and environment organisation she set up in 2009, she has worked with artists such as Joan Jonas, Elizabeth Price, Jeremy Deller, Fei Jun, Mariele Neudecker, Cornelia Parker and Gayle Chong Kwan. Science collaborators include British Government air pollution advisor Professor Frank Kelly (Imperial College London), maritime advisor Professor Alex David Rogers (Oxford University and REV Ocean), biodiversity advisor Kate Jones (UCL) and climate scientist Emily Shuckburgh (Cambridge Zero).

In 2017 she co-curated *Offshore: Artists Explore the Sea* for Hull UK City of Culture, and in 2018, together with author Margaret Atwood and Christiania Figueres, leader of the IPCC Paris Climate Agreement 2015, she explored climate change in *Under Her Eye*. Current Invisible Dust projects are *Wild Eye*, on art and wildlife in North Yorkshire; *Climate Clock* for Oulu Finland EU Capital of Culture 2026; and *Living Nature* for the British Library London, a hybrid summit exploring and celebrating the diversity of human relationships within nature including artists and indigenous leaders.
